Altar Guild: **Nancy Grimes** MUSIC NOTES Since the beginning of Lent, we have been utilizing traditional plainsong melodies written a thousand years ago as the Introits for our services. Beginning in Eastertide, we began singing the traditional Alleluia chants to celebrate this festive season. In this morning's service, we also hear a traditional Offertory chant from this same Gregorian chant repertory.

Each of the proper chants composed for every Sunday's celebration of the service of Holy Communion are distinct in style. The Alleluia chant is much more melismatic than the Introit (having many notes sung to a single syllable). A hallmark of the Alleluia chant is the prolonged melisma final syllable of the word "Alleluia," called the *jubilus*. The Offertory was, at one time, the most virtuosic of the chants in this repertory. In places where these chants are regularly sung, it is usually only the first portion of the Offertory chant that is used. But originally, these chants also contained verses, likely intended for a highly skilled soloist, that were among the most expressive and elaborate composition in this style of composition. And it is the complete Offertory chant, verses included, that we hear sung today, the same way Christians worshipping a thousand years ago would have heard.

American composer Joan Tower's (b. 1938) arresting *Ascent* was her first composition for organ. *The New Yorker* has called Tower "one of the most successful woman composers of all time." At the 1996 convention of the American Guild of Organists in New York City, *Ascent* received its premiere on the large Mander organ of the Roman Catholic Church of St. Ignatius Loyola (this morning's Ascensiontide performance is given on a Mander organ of less than half the size). The title refers to the rising scales in this piece, which form the central thematic material.
