All the elders of Israel gathered together and came to Samuel at Ramah, and said to him, "You are old and your sons do not follow in your ways; appoint for us, then, a king to govern us, like other nations." But the thing displeased Samuel when they said, "Give us a king to govern us." Samuel prayed to the Lord, and the Lord said to Samuel, "Listen to the voice of the people in all that they say to you; for they have not rejected you, but they have rejected me from being king over them. Just as they have done to me, from the day I brought them up out of Egypt to this day, forsaking me and serving other gods, so also they are doing to you. Now then, listen to their voice; only—you shall solemnly warn them, and show them the ways of the king who shall reign over them."

MUSIC NOTES French composer Lili Boulanger (1893–1918) fell ill as a young child, and thereafter lived with a severely weakened immune system. Though her health largely prevented her from pursuing a conventional music education, her musical family supported her study of music through private composition and instrumental performance instruction. Her father, Ernest Boulanger, established himself as a capable composer when he won the coveted Prix de Rome in 1835. Lili's older sister Nadia Boulanger, who later enjoyed a great career as a composer and pedagogue, was unsuccessful in her bid to match her father's achievement in 1909. Afterward, Lili was also determined to compete for the prize, and in 1913 became the first woman to be awarded the Prix de Rome in musical composition. In her few remaining years of life, Lili also enjoyed a publishing contract with Ricordi and finished a number of pieces, including some large-scale psalm settings. Her last composition, *Pie Jesu*, was dictated to her sister Nadia in the final weeks of her life.

English composer Herbert Howells (1892–1983) also dealt with severe ill-health around the time of Lili Boulanger's death, and, for a time, he was not expected to live. While his health prohibited him from continuing as an organist, Howells immersed himself in English music of the past and turned his attention toward composition. Howells's music is a unique synthesis of different styles: early English modality, textures of Ralph Vaughan Williams, and even the impressionistic harmonies of Maurice Ravel. All of Howells's technical ability and intimate knowledge of the organ is put to stunning effect in his revered Psalm-Preludes, tone poems on single verses from the psalms. His second set of Psalm-Preludes was composed in 1938-39 and reflect his mature style.
