(5:6-10,11-13,14-17)

We are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord—for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yes, we do have confidence, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him. For all of us must appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense for what has been done in the body, whether good or evil.

Therefore, knowing the fear of the Lord, we try to persuade others; but we ourselves are well known to God, and I hope that we are also well known to your consciences. We are not commending ourselves to you again, but giving you an opportunity to boast about us, so that you may be able to answer those who boast in outward appearance and not in the heart. For if we are beside ourselves, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you. For the love of Christ urges us on, because we are convinced that one has died for all; therefore all have died. And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them. From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!

MUSIC NOTES Michael Head (1900-1976) is a minor but, I believe, under-appreciated figure in English art song. Known almost exclusively for his vocal music, Head published 100 songs in his lifetime. His music is harmonically conservative and melodically simple, standing at the intersection of classical art song and popular ballad, and therefore has a great deal of charm. Head's setting of *The Lord's Prayer* is a delicate and straightforward presentation of the text that uses subtle devices like the key change on "forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive them" and the musical climax on "the kingdom, the power, and the glory" to draw out the import of these words. – *Samantha Arten*

French composer Nadia Boulanger (1887–1979) had an impressive array of students, many of whom hailed from American shores, including Burt Bacharach, Aaron Copland, Philip Glass, Quincy Jones, and Virgil Thomson. Nadia Boulanger considered her sister Lili Boulanger to be a more gifted composer than herself. Shortly after Lili's death in 1918, Nadia stopped composing new works and devoted herself to teaching composition. Her *Trois Improvisations* were written in 1911.

Josephine Boulay (1869–1925) was a French organist and composer. Boulay became blind at age three, so her initial studies in music were with the Blind Sisters of St. Paul and the National Institute for the Blind. In 1888, she became the first woman to win a first prize in organ at the Paris Conservatory. While continuing her study of music, she took up a professorship at the National Institute for the Blind. In 1897 she won first prize in the composition class of Gabriel Fauré. *– David Sinden*
