## The Lessons

Lector: A Reading from The Letter to the Hebrews. (5: 1-10)

Every high priest chosen from among mortals is put in charge of things pertaining to God on their behalf, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is subject to weakness; and because of this he must offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not presume to take this honor, but takes it only when called by God, just as Aaron was.

So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son,

today I have begotten you";

as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever,

according to the order of Melchizedek."

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.


- All: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

MUSIC NOTES English composer William Byrd (c. 1540–1623) wrote three settings of the Mass for three, four, and five voices respectively. The Gloria at this service is from Byrd's Mass for Five Voices. Music for the liturgy of the English Church, was expected to be in the English language, so by writing this music in Latin, Byrd was expressing a personal religious conviction at great personal risk. These Mass settings would have been sung by and for sympathetic Catholics in private home chapels, away from prying Protestant eyes and ears. Stephen Buzard, the Director of Music at St. James Cathedral, Chicago, recently reflected about how the imposed absence from choral singing beginning in March 2020 gives us some understanding of what it would have been like for the community that was forbidden to sing this glorious music. • At Communion, the Choir sings "The eyes of all wait upon thee" by Jean Berger (1909–2002). Born Arthur Schloßberg in Westphalia, Berger had a widely varied career in music. He was working at an opera house in Germany in 1933 when he fled to Paris (where he adopted his French name). After working in Rio de Janiero, Berger became an American citizen in 1943. He worked in the Office of War Information, and then for CBS and NBC. His academic career began in 1948 and took him to Vermont, Illinois, and Colorado.
