MUSIC NOTES The Anglo-Canadian Healy Willan was a formidable musician and a prolific composer. He was the Precentor (Organist & Choirmaster) at St. Mary Magdelene in Toronto. Under his leadership, the church became "a North American mecca for choral and Anglican church musicians." Willan wrote hundreds of works, many of which were for the church. His short anthem, "Arise, shine, for thy Light is come" was written in 1960 for the Choir of Resurrection Lutheran Church in nearby Sappington, Missouri.

During this period when the service is time is limited, we will mostly forgo composed organ voluntaries at the end of the service in favor of short improvisations.
