The mysticism and liturgies of this tradition influenced his composition, particularly his large body of sacred music. When in Jordan thou wast baptized was commissioned by the Friends of Rochester Cathedral in 2001 to celebrate the dedication of a new baptismal fresco. • Peter Hallock (1924–2014) was a remarkable figure in Episcopal church music who is remembered as a "mystic, solitary, composer, organist, liturgist, and countertenor." For forty years he was the organist and choirmaster at St. Mark's Cathedral, Seattle. • The Alleluia verse at this service was written by David Sinden (b. 1982) last year. It is dedicated to his daughter Margaret, who was baptized on this day in 2019.

Lisa Acker - Candidate for Member of the Vestry
