Jesus said, "You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not murder'; and 'whoever murders shall be liable to judgment.' But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgment; and if you insult a brother or sister, you will be liable to the council; and if you say, 'You fool,' you will be liable to the hell of fire. So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift. Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are on the way to court with him, or your accuser may hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison. Truly I tell you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny. You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to be thrown into hell. And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to go into hell. It was also said, 'Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' But I say to you that anyone who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, causes her to commit adultery; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery. Again, you have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not swear falsely, but carry out the vows you have made to the Lord.' MUSIC NOTES: Malcolm Boyle (1902–1976) was born in Windsor, England, and sang as a boy chorister at Eton College. He was the Organist and Master of the Choristers at Chester Cathedral from 1932 to 1948. It was during this time that the Welsh organist and choral conductor George Guest was a chorister at Chester and first sang Boyle's anthem Thou, O God, art praised in Sion. For many years the only edition of this piece was one that Guest had written down from memory. • Edward Cuthbert Bairstow (1874–1946) was the Organist and Choirmaster at the Cathedral and Metropolitical Church of Saint Peter in York, better known as York Minster, from 1913 until his death. Jesu, the very thought of thee is one of the finest short anthems in the Anglican repertoire.
