Stewardship Thought: Not Everything is What it Seems

The Gospel for today is the well-known "Parable of the Talents." While seemingly simple on first reading it is actually very complex and open to wide interpretation. The first question to ask is: "What is the God Image?" It would appear that the God image is the Master, who is a tyrant, who gathers wherever he wants, and violently punishes anyone who does not pursue his greed-based goals.

If your image of God is likewise a tyrant, you will interpret the punishment of the fearful slave with one talent as totally appropriate. On the other hand, is this the character of God that Jesus revealed? No! If your image of God is loving then you will find that this whole Gospel story is Jesus at his paradoxical best and the slave with one talent is to be affirmed for being willing to be severely punished for refusing to be an agent of his tyrannical master.

We can apply this parable to our understanding of making a pledge for the coming year. If our God is tyrannical then we would make our pledge because we are afraid of God's punishment. On the other hand, when our God is loving and generous, we will make a financial pledge because we are grateful for what God has given us. And in keeping with our God's generosity, our pledge is an expression of our generosity. I am grateful that we worship a loving God, and not a tyrannical God, at St. Peter's, and for the generosity of parishioners who have made a pledge for 2021.



The remaining music in this service comes from archival recordings made at St. Peter's. The opening hymn, "Lord Christ, when first thou cam'st to earth" is sung to the tune Newnham by Herbert Howells (1892–1983), published by Novello & Co., Ltd. This hymn was sung on the Second Sunday of Advent, 2019.

The Anthem, "Lord, thou hast been our refuge" by Ralph Vaughan Williams is an extended setting of the words of today's psalm and includes a metrical paraphrase of this same psalm by Isaac Watts. This anthem was sung on St. Peter's Day, 2019 but that recording cannot be used because of a persistent electronic hum in the audio (one of many problems we have experienced with our recording system since 2018). This recording comes from the St. Peter's Choir's concert performance on June 2, 2019.

The final hymn, "Come, labor on" was sung on the Fifteenth Sunday after Penteost, 2016.

2021 ANNUAL GIVING CAMPAIGN

COFFEE WITH THE RECTOR: FOLLOW-UP CONVERSATIONS ON CRIMINAL JUSTICE – Brew your cup of joe and join us at **9:15 a.m.** on Zoom (the link to the meeting can be found in Friday's *News from the Rock*). Last month we had some really great conversation about the book and film *Just Mercy*, followed by an excellent presentation by Blake Strode from Arch City Defenders. Many parishioners were not able to participate in these conversations and expressed a desire to have some further discussion about the subject. ADVENT WREATHS! – It is true, Advent is almost here. One tradition that helps us prepare to receive the light of Christ into our lives anew each December 25th is the lighting of the Advent Wreath. Advent Wreaths will be included in the children's December Learning at Home kits (if you would like a kit for your child, please contact Annie Knapp) *and* will be available separately for all other households. If you would like to pick up either a December Learning at Home kit or an Advent Wreath for your home, both will be available after worship on Sunday, November 22 and 29, and also when the church is open for personal prayer on Wednesday, November 25, 9:00 a.m. to Noon. Let your light shine in the season of expectant waiting!

OUTDOOR WORSHIP AS OF NOV. 29 – Beginning the first Sunday of Advent (Nov. 29) we will be worshipping from the front porch at 10:30 a.m. every Sunday when it is 40 degrees or warmer. 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
