MUSIC NOTES: Turn back O Man by Gustav Holst (1874-1934) is the second of Three Hymns for Chorus and Orchestra. It uses the melody of the Old 124th Psalm tune from the Genevan Psalter. • The distinguished English organist and choral conductor Donald Hunt died this past August at the age of 88. Hunt, while Organist and Master of the Choristers at Worcester Cathedral, was a champion of the music of French composer Pierre Villette (1926–1988), whose music has been called "a stylistic bridge between Debussy and Fauré on the one hand and Poulenc and Messiaen on the other." It is due to Hunt that Villette's music is now quite well-known in the Anglican Church, and has even been included in the annual Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols at King's College, Cambridge.
