See this and other pieces in the context of our last 150 years at stpetersepiscopal.org/timeline • Coincidentally, Lionel Dakers, the composer of the chant for the Introit, served Special Commissioner for RSCM from 1958 to 1972, and Director from 1972 to 1990. • The Anthem is drawn from the famous oratorio Messiah by George Frideric Handel (1685-1759). The Choir sang Parts 2 and 3 of *Messiah* in concert with orchestra on April 29.
